A Summer task to get you thinking about your potential new A Level...	Research where each of the main UK Political Parties stand on key policy areas (Health care, foreign policy, welfare, taxation, education). Decide which party you would vote for if there was an election this year.
Five fun learning challenges to undertake before September	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Research your local MP, who is he/she; which party do they represent; which constituency do they represent; what have they recently shown an interest in; research their voting history to see where they stand on key issues.</li><li>2. Watch the news between now and September. Create a 10 question quiz to test the rest of the class when you come back.</li><li>4. Research one pressure group that currently exists in the UK. Who are they? What type of group are they? (causal, sectional, insider, outsider) What are they campaigning for and why? What methods have they used to campaign? Do you think they have been successful so far?</li><li>5. Research the arguments for and against giving 16 year olds the vote. Decide what your overall judgement is.</li></ol>
