

Aim:

We would like to prevent knife crime and harassment and our aim is for youth (13-21) to identify, assess and prevent possible dangers, in a workshop format, when walking alone on streets in the dark.

After the workshop, the aim was revised and the conclusion was: We want to prevent knife crime and harassment for 7-17 year olds when travelling home in the dark.

Delivery details:

What:

- We want to make a workshop to promote awareness of knife crime and harassment, self-defence, alternative methods to violence and what to do if you see violence taking place.

How:

- We will spread this into the wider community, bringing it into youth groups, website, workshops in many different schools.

Who:

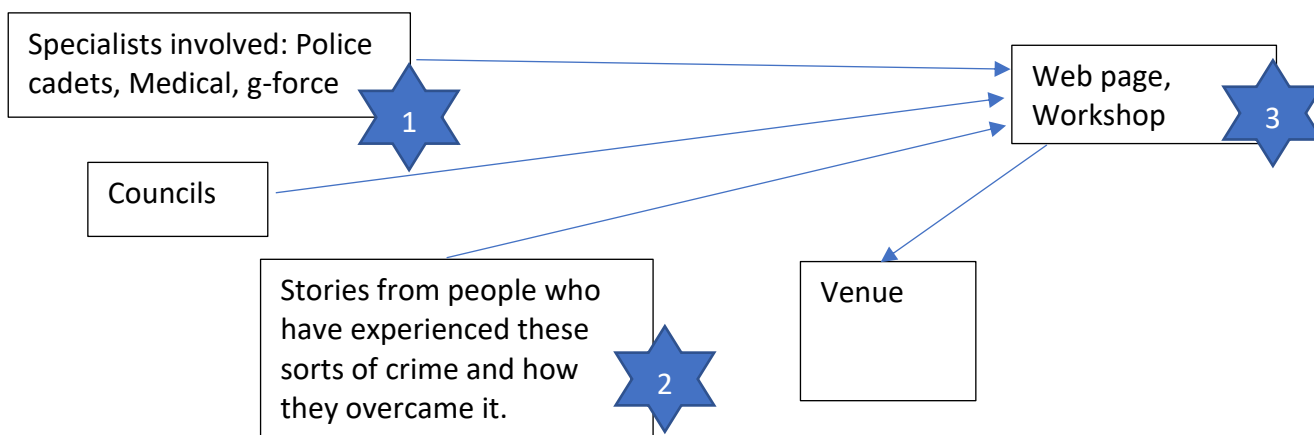

Anticipated Challenges and Risk Analysis:

Challenge / Risk	Impact / Likelihood	Mitigating action
Volunteer availability	4 x 7 = 28	We can reorder / distribute workshop times. Provide monetary incentive.
Timeframe	3 x 8 = 24	Volunteers are eager to help
Unresponsive schools	5 x 3 = 15	We can film / record the workshops for busy schools
